## Temporary documents and legal status



#### Permission to come to Canada

- Visitor visa
- <u>Electronic Travel Authorization</u> (eTA)


#### Permits to stay in Canada

- Study permit
- Work permit

#### **Legal status**

- <u>Temporary resident</u>
- Permanent resident
- <u>Canadian citizen</u>

### **Implied status**



#### **Extend your study permit**

- Make sure your school is on the <u>Designated</u> <u>Learning Institutions List</u>
- Gather all required documents
- Apply online, ideally 3-4 months in advance

#### **Implied status**

- If you applied for a new study permit before your old one expired, you can keep studying until a decision is made on your application
- You must remain in Canada

## National Occupational Classification (NOC)

NOC 0: management jobs skilled

jobs

NOC B: technical jobs and skilled trades

**NOC A:** professional jobs

**NOC C:** semi-skilled jobs


**NOC D:** entry-level jobs

**IMPORTANT:** Work experience in **skilled jobs** (NOC 0, A, or B) is required before you can apply for PR through Express Entry



## **Express Entry & Comprehensive Ranking System**




#### **Express Entry**

- Online system to manage applications for permanent residence from skilled workers
- User-friendly
- Free


#### **Comprehensive Ranking System (CRS)**

- Points-based system which scores candidates and ranks them in the Express Entry pool
- Includes a core set of points up to 600 and a set of additional points of up to 600
- Top-scoring candidates are invited to apply for permanent residence

# Your journey so far...



## Gaining work experience while studying



**Work on-campus** 

- Full-time student at an eligible educational institution
- Study permit says you can work on- or offcampus
- Have started studying
- Have a Social Insurance Number (SIN)



**Work off-campus** 

- Full-time student at a <u>designated learning</u> <u>institution (DLI)</u>
- Study program is minimum 6 months and leads to a degree, diploma or certificate
- Study permit says you can work off-campus
- Have started studying and have a SIN



# Work as a co-op student or intern


- Work is required to complete your study program in Canada
- Letter from your <u>school</u>
   that confirms all students
   in your program need to
   complete work placements
   to get your degree
- Totals 50% or less of your study program

### Options after completing study program



- You can travel outside Canada and return with valid visa or eTA while application in process
- If you apply when your study permit is still valid, you can work full-time until a decision is made
- You must stop working if your application is refused
- If you wait over 90 days after program completion to apply, you cannot work while your application is in process


### **Post-Graduation Work Permit (PGWP)**



Apply within 180 days of receiving written confirmation (including final

**transcript**) from school that you can graduate

## Pathway to permanent residence through Express Entry




**Express Entry** is your first step to immigrate permanently as a skilled worker under:

<u>Canadian Experience</u> <u>Class</u> (CEC)



A portion of the Provincial Nominee Program (PNP)

- Only skilled work experience (NOC 0, A, B) qualifies for Express Entry
- Pass an approved language test—results must be less than two years old when you
  - complete your Express Entry profile, and
  - apply for permanent residence

### Minimum eligibility criteria for Express Entry



# Federal Skilled Worker Program (FSW)

- At least 1 year of continuous Canadian or foreign work experience (NOC 0, A or B) within the last 10 years
- Canadian secondary or postsecondary certificate, diploma or degree, or the foreign equivalent
- A score of 67 or higher out of 100 on the FSW points grid
- **CLB 7** in all 4 language abilities



# Federal Skilled Trades Program (FST)

- At least 24 months of work experience (NOCB) in an eligible skilled trade within the last 5 years
- Valid job offer in the skilled trade for at least 1 year, or a Canadian certificate of qualification
- CLB 5 in speaking and listening;
   CLB 4 in reading and writing
- Meet job requirements as set by NOC (except the requirement related to certification)



# Canadian Experience Class (CEC)

- At least 12 months of skilled Canadian work experience (NOC 0, A or B) within the last 3 years
- NOC 0, A jobs: CLB 7 in all 4 abilities
- NOC B jobs: CLB 5 in all 4 abilities

#### Work experience requirements



FSW (NOC 0, A or B)

- 1 year of continuous work in one skilled occupation within last 10 years
- Paid work



FST (NOCB)

2 years of work in an eligible trade within last 5 years



CEC (NOC 0, A or B)

- 1 year in any skilled occupation within last 3 years
- Experience gained by working in Canada legally
- Experience gained during full-time study or selfemployment does not count

Full-time: 30 hours/week for 12 months = 1 year full time (1,560 hours), or Part-time: 15 hours/week for 24 months = 1 year full time (1,560 hours)

More than 1 job: 30 hours/week for 12 months at more than 1 job = 1 year full time (1,560 hours)

# **Express Entry profile**


#### **IMPORTANT**

- Profile is valid for one year
- Keep it up-to-date
- There are no guarantees
- Be truthful





## **Comprehensive Ranking System (CRS)**



## Invitation to Apply (ITA)

- Issued to the highest scoring candidates in the Express Entry pool in each invitation round
- Minimum CRS score for ITA (March 4, 2020): 471

## CRS additional points: provincial/territorial nomination



Provincial/territorial nomination (PNP): 600 points

- Candidates nominated under Express Entry PNP stream of province or territory
- <u>Criteria and streams</u> differ across the country
- You must meet minimum entry criteria for Express Entry including those for 1 of the 3 federal economic programs



### CRS additional points: valid job offer



Valid job offer (NOC 00): 200 points



Valid job offer (NOC 0, A or B): **50 points** 



Job offer must be:

- minimum 1 year once you receive PR;
- non-seasonal;
- NOC 0, A, or B; and
- supported by a <u>Labour Market Impact</u>
   <u>Assessment (LMIA)</u> unless one is not needed
- You can still get points for Canadian work experience without a valid job offer



## CRS additional points: education completed in Canada




Diploma or certificate (1 or 2 years): 15 points



Degree, diploma or certificate (3 years or longer), Master's, entry-to-practice professional degree, or doctoral degree (minimum one academic year): **30 points** 

- You must have completed the studies at a Designated Learning Institution (DLI)
- Each educational program needs to be entered separately into the Express Entry profile



## CRS additional points: Canada's official languages



French test results at NCL 7 in all four abilities: **15** additional points



French test results of NCL 7 in all four abilities
+ English test results at CLB 5 or higher:
30 additional points

### CRS additional points: sibling in Canada









At least one sibling who is a Canadian permanent resident or citizen, is residing in Canada, and is aged at least 18 years old: **15 points** 

- Sibling = the biological or adoptive children of candidate or accompanying spouse's
  - father or mother
  - father or mother's spouse
  - father or mother's common-law partner

## Get an ITA then apply for permanent residence online

#### Complete application requires:

- ☐ Electronic application for permanent residence (e-APR)
- ☐ Cost recovery fees
- Supporting documentation





#### **Document checklist**

- Medical examination confirmation
- Police certificates
- Biometrics
- Copy of the biographical data page of a passport or travel document
- Proof of work experience
- Other documents as required

#### For complete applications:

- We verify all eligibility and admissibility criteria
- We process them in six months or less, 80% of the time






